

TRAVEL LESSONS

"WHAT I DID THIS SUMMER" is usually the first essay of the school year for students. My own essay would include a trip to El Salvador, staying at Nuestros Pequeños Hermanos (Spanish for "Our Little Brothers and Sisters"). NPH was originally founded in Mexico, by Father William Wasson in 1954, as a home to care for orphaned,

abandoned and at-risk children. He created a safe place where children could thrive within a culture of unconditional love and faith at its core. Currently, NPH nurtures children and transforms lives in nine countries in Latin America and the Caribbean.

With permission from Cardinal George, I worked as a priest as the Regional Director of our NPH homes in Central America from 2005 until 2010. Last month, I returned to El Salvador, and as I walked through the enormous doors, the aromas of handmade tortillas mixed with the cow farm next door instantly filled me with memories from five years of service there. I instantly smiled and thought to myself, what a blessing to be back here! I knew, of course, I would be sacrificing many of the creature comforts of home during my visit.

While I was there, NPH celebrated its 24th anniversary of operating a home in El Salvador. We began the day with an early Mass, and I was uplifted knowing the tradition of full and active participation in the liturgy still exists there, as over 500 children enthusiastically sang and responded to the prayers.

After Mass, everyone changed out of their "church clothes" and into their "play clothes." By 9 a.m. it was already 95 degrees, so I, too, decided to change out of my black suit and roman collar and into a T-shirt and sandals. It was a good decision because the day's next activity was an hour-long Zumba/salsa class! Did the bishop Zumba and salsa? Yes! However, trust me when I say that I lacked all skill and grace while doing it—it was an exercise in true humility that also got my heart pumping.

The rest of the day was filled with games and soccer tournaments as we basked in each other's warm friendship and lively conversation. The highlight for the children was being served hotdogs, a bag of chips and a can of pop for lunch. While you may think this is rather basic food, these children are accustomed to eating rice and beans daily, so this was a wonderful and welcomed treat.

After my morning holy hour the next day, I waited for the daily ritual of the water trickling on at 6 a.m. After showering, I dressed in my black suit, roman collar and pectoral cross and got into a pickup truck to drive across the border to Guatemala—a trip that should have taken about two-and-a-half hours. However, because of the condition of the roads scattered with potholes and fallen trees, the drive took almost four hours.

I arrived in the town of Santa Rosa de Lima to ordain Juan Carlos Pirir. For the past four years he has been a seminarian studying for the Diocese of Joliet. After completing his studies, I ordained him a priest there in his hometown as he was surrounded by his parents, siblings, relatives and just about everyone else from the town.

Before and after the Mass, fireworks were launched. And outside of the church, with its large choir and sacred music, the spirit of fiesta filled the air with booming music along with colorful balloons, banners and decorations. It was an amazing celebration and reflected the deep faith in that community, which formed Father Juan Carlos Pirir and fostered his vocation.

Back in El Salvador, a strong storm came through and knocked out the power my last night there. But instead of being upset by this inconvenience, I was thankful for the rain which cooled everything down, including me.

As I went to bed, I thanked God for keeping me safe during my travels. I asked for special blessings upon the dear children of NPH and upon Father Juan's proud family and supportive community. My "summer essay" would thank God for the comforts we enjoy "back home" and often take for granted: our safety, food, water, electricity and our parish communities.

Silver Rose Prayer Service Tuesday August 29 at 7:30 pm. at St. Peter the Apostle Parish in Itasca

A nine-month pilgrimage of the Silver Rose will be the centerpiece of a special prayer service by The Knights of Columbus and St. Peter the Apostle – Council 10884. All are welcome.

The journey of the Silver Rose began on February 25 this year and ends on December 12, the Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe. During that time, Silver Roses travel from town to town along eight routes throughout North America. Several of those routes begin in Canada and end in Mexico. The Silver Rose Program began in 1960, when the first rose – a live one – was blessed by a bishop in Ontario. The rose then traveled to New York and then to Texas where it was taken across the border into Mexico. The rose ended its pilgrimage at the Basilica of Our Lady of Guadalupe in Monterrey on December 12, the Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe. To better ensure future annual trips, a "silver rose" was ultimately created. Today, due to the popularity of the program throughout the North American continent, eight silver roses travel unique routes. All members of the community are invited to join the Knights of Columbus and St. Peter the Apostle – Itasca – Council 10884 to pray for a civilization of love and culture of life in our own country and throughout the world. 


The 20th Sunday of Ordinary Time


The prophet Isaiah paints a picture of radical inclusivity in today's first reading. Throughout the Old Testament, we hear of God's special relationship with the Israelites, the people God called and claimed as God's own. Yet God's loving care is not bound to the Israelites or any one group of people. God welcomes all. God loves all. God creates a house of prayer for all people who join themselves to the Lord. God's embrace of the foreigner models how we are to approach people from different backgrounds today.


Every line of scripture offers a wellspring of insights and opportunities for reflection. St. Paul is a particularly gifted writer who draws audiences in with his powerful observations. One such line from today's second letter to the Romans reads:

"For the gifts and the call of God are irrevocable." Let us take a moment to soak in this reality. God gives us gifts that can never be taken away, gifts like love, mercy, and complete acceptance. God also calls each of us to lives of discipleship—and within that, to a myriad of relationships, works, and service opportunities. The specific contexts may change as we move through life, but the presence of God's call will remain with each of us forever.

The Canaanite women in today's gospel model an authentic, vulnerable way of interacting with Jesus. She recognizes Jesus as Lord and asks directly for help. She persists when Jesus rebukes and insults her. By the end, Jesus changes heart and praises the women's faith. In what ways could this woman's witness inspire your own faith life? Family Connection to the Gospel

Even when spurned by Jesus, the faith of the Canaanite woman makes her bold enough to argue and ask again for what she needs. Her persistence and great confidence that Jesus could heal her daughter reminds us of the confidence with

which our children bring to us their own needs. In their faith and trust we can find modern examples of how we might approach God in prayer.

As a family recall some times when a request for something was presented by one family member to another with confidence and persistence. If the request was denied, talk about why that was so. If the request was eventually granted, talk about what led to the change of heart. Then read together today's Gospel, Matthew 15:21-28. Was anyone surprised by Jesus' response to the Canaanite woman? Why or why not? What makes Jesus change his mind and heal the woman's daughter? When we pray, God wants us to be as confident in his mercy. Invite family members to identify the things that they most need from God. Pray these prayers of petition together as a family, confident that God will hear and answer your prayers. Today's Gospel shows how faith can cure. While the Canaanite woman's daughter was physically healed, our healings may be more spiritual in nature. In our individual experiences, we have knowledge that God can and does heal some of our medical problems, but not all. In every situation, however, God is walking with us and getting us through difficult and terrible times. We only need to let God help.

God's guidance helps us discern ways to become a more effective follower of Christ. We further seek God's guidance in enhancing our experience of St. Philip's being a welcoming home.

Fr. Mallon in *Divine Renovation* notes that in the last 50 years there has been the most accelerated social change in human history, but in the church world, we have insisted on pastoral methodologies that presume a bygone ideal culture of the past. Parishes are caught between an experience of a call and desire for renewal, and the weight of Church culture that leans towards maintaining the status quo. This is a painful situation to Fr. Mallon, and to us.

He writes, "In the House of God, the things that need to be cleared out can literally be structures that no longer serve the mission or that prevent the mission from being fulfilled. They can also be attitudes, ideas or theological perspectives that hinder our ability to fulfill the missionary mandate given to us by Jesus."

Fr. Mallon notes that at times, a fundamentalism and supposed soundness of doctrine leads to elitism whereby instead of evangelizing, we classify others instead of opening the door to grace. We practice "clericalism" where the parishioner lets the priest, deacon, sister, lay minister etc. "do it" since that is the easy way. Clerics etc. often feel more comfortable and even pleased when the laity lets them "do it."

To add to this conundrum, many Catholics have an image of God as distant, cold, and unapproachable. In their view of Christian life, it mercilessly demands moral perfection. Neither of these understandings comports with Jesus' message.

Fr. Mallon notes that many of us have missed the joy of the Gospel and feel condemned to a miserable, joyless moralism destined to leave us disillusioned with the bitter taste of our own inevitable failure and collapse. He believes there is a human tendency to reduce the Christian faith to some form of moral rigorism or mere ethics.

"Rather than receiving our Savior through faith and living this faith out in love through good works, all of which are grounded in the free gift of God's grace, we strive to be, well...'nice."

Next week we'll continue this theme. Peace be with you always.

The mercy of God goes well beyond religious affiliation. In today's readings we hear of the immensity of God's love for his people. We all are created in his likeness and all that God creates is intrinsically good. It is the choices we make that determines our standing with God. In Isaiah we hear that anyone who loves God and keeps his covenant will be acceptable to him. Our love of others is a reflection

of our love of our creator.

In Romans, God shows his mercy to gentiles to help the others realize that Christ died for all people. Given this revelation of the reconciliation of the world through the obedience of Jesus accepting the will of the Father also opens the door of forgiveness for all people. Even when we stray, God still loves us and will welcome us back to him through our willing acts of humility and contrition. As it says in the psalms, "a humble and contrite heart he will not spurn." God is always there for us even when we move from him.

In the gospel, Jesus grants the request of the Canaanite woman. In her strong, almost defiant plea to intercede on behalf of her daughter, she demonstrates the desire for mercy along with an unfailing faith that Jesus is a way for her to experience the great power of our own prayers for others. We have all prayed for others at one time. This type of prayer truly shows the sacrifice of Christ on the
