

LENTEN REGULATIONSEveryone 14 years of age or over is bound to

abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday and all the Fridays of Lent. All from the age of 18 years up to the beginning of their 60th year are bound to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. On these two days of fast and abstinence, only one full meatless meal is allowed. Two other meatless meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to each one's needs, but together they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted on these two days, but liquids, including milk and fruit juices are allowed. When health or ability to work would be seriously affected, the law does not oblige. To disregard completely the law of fast and abstinence is seriously sinful. Lent is the principal season of penance in the Church year. All of the faithful are strongly urged to develop and follow a program of voluntary self-denial (in addition to following the Lenten regulations), serious prayer, and a performance of works of charity and mercy.

Question: Where do Palm Sunday palms come from and where should they go?

Answer: The Palm Sunday celebration has ancient

origins. Beginning the liturgy "outside" the church, we symbolically reenact Christ's entry into Jerusalem. The crowds in ancient Israel waved palm branches—a symbol of royalty—to welcome Jesus. These days, obtaining palms takes a lot of planning and coordination, as hundreds of thousands of churches worldwide need them on the same day! Many in the United States order palms from Florida, California, Texas, or Central America. Many companies stress the sustainability of their production and the just wages paid to their workers.

The palms used on Palm Sunday are blessed at Mass. This means they shouldn't end up in the trash! Many people weave palms into crosses or families display them in their homes. If you do not plan on displaying your palms throughout the year, they should be burned, buried, or left at the church. In the final case, the palms are burned to provide the ashes for next year's Ash Wednesday service.



Please use the following reflection to help your family celebrate Palm Sunday. Palm, or Passion, Sunday begins the most sacred week of the Church year—Holy Week. During these days, we prepare ourselves for Easter by prayerful reflection upon the events of Jesus' Passion and death. You might display a crucifix in a prominent place this week, as reminder of the salvation Christ won for us. The crucifix can also be the focal point for family prayer

during Holy Week. Because of the length and complexity of the Passion narrative, young children have difficulty remaining attentive when it is proclaimed in its entirety. Families can choose to read a portion of this Sunday's Gospel each day of Holy Week, providing ample opportunity for children to ask questions and respond to the events described there. In this way, the entire week can become a "way of the cross." Each day during Holy Week, the family can gather in a prayerful space with a crucifix as the focal point. After reading from the Gospel each night, the family might reflect on the reading together. Conclude your prayer time together by praying the Lord's Prayer and/or singing an appropriate hymn, such as "Jesus, Jesus," "Were You There?" or "What Wondrous Love Is This."

Jesus' divinity is always a reality—and the readings of Holy Week draw our attention to Jesus' humanity in particular ways. Over the coming days, the church invites us to accompany our brother Jesus on his journey to Jerusalem. The liturgies of Holy Week offer chances to feel with Jesus and his disciples—the palm

branches waving in the streets, the water that washed over our feet, the bread and wine shared in memory of Christ, the wood of the cross. We can also feel the difficult emotions that may have welled within Jesus during his final days—sadness over saying goodbye to his beloved disciples, loneliness from a friend's betrayal, anguish over his impending death. These core elements of Holy Week, both the tangible objects and the emotions, are central to human life. Our God knows them intimately.

As we celebrate the Eucharist today, let us give thanks for Jesus and his great gift of self. Let us each consider how we might journey with Jesus during this holiest of weeks.

Palm/Passion Sunday is the only time in the liturgical year when we have two Gospels proclaimed in Mass. The reason for this is to give us a full, contrasting view of the last days of Jesus on earth. We experience not only the great love that the

people had for him, but also how humanity can easily reject God. Jesus enters Jerusalem to great admiration on a beast of burden—the burden of our sins. Then, as jealousy and fear come to those people in "power" who feared losing their standing and lifestyle, they handed him over for his death. But his death is a victory, as Jesus himself carries the same burden of sin to Calvary in obedience to the Father. This great act of self-sacrifice opens the gates of heaven and brings forth the salvation of all those who believe.

The days of the Triduum are the greatest in the life of the Church. As you attend the commemoration of the Passion, Death, and Resurrection of Christ, you are present through these events. By being present, a greater appreciation and understanding of our faith unfolds.

If you have never attended the fullness of the Triduum, I invite you to do so. We are called to walk with our Lord Jesus every day, and once a year we have the opportunity to truly walk with him as he reaches the completion of his earthly mission. This is the same mission that we received when we were baptized—the mission of revealing the presence of God through our lives so others may come to know the eternal love and forgiveness that is offered to all people.

What's your car? Let's say it's a fancy silver Toyota. Now imagine you're having lunch in a restaurant and suddenly see two men outside attempting to steal it. You run outside and confront them. They respond, "The master has need of it." How do you respond? Would you just let them take it, and leave you without a car? I don't think I would. Yet that is precisely what the owners of the colt on Palm Sunday do. Stunningly, and perhaps a little comically, Jesus instructs two of his disciples to commandeer a colt for him to ride. And when they hear the disciples say, "The master has need of it," they let them take it. Of course, Jesus knew they'd let it go. He gave them the grace to let go of what is rightfully theirs. The result? That colt became perhaps the most famous and important animal ever. The beast plays a role in the redemption of the world. As Holy Week begins, Jesus perhaps will send people to you to ask for something valuable to you. Perhaps it's your car. More likely it's something like your attention, time, or energy. It's natural to resist at first. We've got things to do. after all. But if the interruption is from Jesus himself, listen to that voice which calmly says, "The master has need of it." And simply let it go. You'll be amazed what the master will do with it. (Father John Muir)
