



The 2024 Catholic Ministries Annual Appeal has begun!


Diocese of Joliet Catholic Ministries Annual Appeal (CMAA), we are humbly asking all parishioners to pledge their

Letters to the Parish Preparing for the Sacrament of Confirmation

As part of their preparations for their Confirmation on January 27, 2024, the eighth-grade students from school and the Religious Education Program wrote letters to St. Philip parishioners. The letter below is from Michelle Roberson, an eighth-grade student at St. Philip the Apostle School. Please keep all of these students in your prayers as they continue their preparations toward adulthood in the Church.

Dear St. Philip the Apostle Parish, My name is Michelle. My mom decided on this name because it is the female version of Micheal, after Saint Micheal the Archangel. I am blessed to have such a powerful saint to watch over me. I have always had a strong religious foundation in my life. My parents lift me up and support me in my faith. I don't think things are perfect, but they don't have to be. I have been in Catholic schools my whole life, but I started attending St. Philip in second grade. I have made amazing connections here. My friends and teachers are very wise and help me understand my faith better. I want to especially acknowledge my teacher, Mrs. Sannasardo. She is so inspirational and a true vessel for the Holy Spirit while we make this confirmation journey as a class. When I'm confirmed, I want to be able to guide people like I am being led now.

This year has been very transformative for me. I go to church and pray before meals, but for the first time I've started to realize why. My family has always guided me through everything I need to know about my faith. But, now I've started to pray on my own time, and truly speak with God during mass and rosary. I think that I'm starting a relationship that I always thought I had. As I grow closer to God, and with confirmation so close at hand, satan is more prevalent in my life. I've struggled recently with balancing some aspects of my faith. I prayed for a long while for Mary's help, but I couldn't quite reach the peace I was searching for. I turned to my confirmation saint and, despite the reassurance, it was still hard to work things out. Eventually, I asked for inspiration from the Holy Spirit. I came to decide that talking with my priest was the best way to settle my heart. In the end, I was able to work out what was bothering me, and do what I hoped was right. The point is, I am starting to discover the way God works directly and indirectly in my life. It's hard to express the change in my life, but it seems so clear to me. I have a real desire to be good for Him. Scripture always says how Christ wants to be our friend. It sounds so obvious, but I don't think it's as easy as it seems. I always considered myself His friend, but was I really? If I never talk to someone except out of politeness, if I visit his or her house but don't pay attention to him or her, am I really a friend? I think not. So, it's this train of thought that made me realize my relationship with God needs the same, if not more, attention as any other. It's hard, but God really is there and I can talk to Him.

After confirmation I will be ready to truly start my journey in faith. I want to live more fully as a child of God. I want to be confirmed because I want to live with God. This is the first step of my journey. It's really exciting to know that I am beginning a life with Christ. There's a lot about myself, and even more about God, that I don't know. There are lots of things in my life that bring me closer to the truth and Him. Every day, I don't go to lunch in the gym or go to recess. Instead, my best friend Maria and I go to the preschool room to help out. I love it. There is something really special about such young kids. We eat lunch there and also help with the activity that day. My favorite is when we read books to them. I know I want to be a caregiver, and this helped me discover that. We found out it counted for service hours too, which is really awesome. I hope caregiving is something that can be a big part of my life. So many people have taken care of me. My parents have always supported me and helped me grow up to be the person I am. Especially my gramma. She babysat me when I was very young, and she does the same for my cousins. She still picks me up from school some days when my mom goes into the office. I love her so much. She is probably the most faithful person I know. Every conversation with her is about Christ. It's amazing. She cares so much and has a story all of her own. She inspires me. That's why I choose Gramma as my sponsor.

I asked her on the front lawn of her house on my birthday. Gramma was delighted to help me in my faith in such a vital way. Recently, I forwarded her my saint paper for confirmation. She said that Dymphna was a good saint for me. St. Dymphna means a lot. She was a princess who took a vow of chastity when she was a young teen. Her mother passed away soon after. Her father was driven mad by grief. Some of his advisors told him there was only one woman as beautiful as his late wife. Dymphna. Fortunately, she discovered her father's wicked intentions and fled to Geel. She created a hospice for the mentally ill there. But still, her father found her and asked for her hand in marriage. She denied him, and he struck her down. It seems sad, Dymphna was barely 15 when she passed. Her life was riddled with unspeakable acts. Yet, I think Dymphna is so strong. She was able to love her pagan father even though their beliefs were different. When the basic truths of marriage and love were challenged, Dymphna did not give in. It seems like it should be obvious that her father's intentions were sinful. However, we are losing our grasp on the importance of marriage in today's society. When that goes, other boundaries will be soon to follow. There is so much more about Dymphna that I connect with. I want to be as strong as her. I think that her desire to heal the mentally ill is something I really admire. I want to work with people the way she did.

I hope that these words can really express what I am feeling. In the days leading up to confirmation, I am getting ready for my parish to welcome me in a new way. I am planning to join a youth group at my parish soon, and I hope I will meet other inspired Catholic youths. I am so well supported in my journey, and I am very grateful for the amazing people that are guiding me. I want to face the world with God in my heart. Dymphna guides me, and I hope she is proud when I am finished. Have a nice day! God be with you, Michelle Roberson



Family Connection to the Gospel

The tradition of giving gifts at Christmas is thought by some to be rooted in the gift giving of the Magi. In many cultures, gifts are not exchanged at Christmas, but rather on the feast of the Epiphany. Whenever you exchange your Christmas gifts, take some time to reflect on this tradition of gift giving at Christmas. Think of the best gift you have received. What was it? What made it special? Was it the gift itself, the thought that went into it, or the person who gave it to you?

Read today's Gospel, Matthew 2:1-12. The gifts of the Magi—gold, frankincense, and myrrh—have come to be understood as symbols of Christ's royalty, divinity, and eventual suffering and death. They are special because in giving them, the Magi acknowledge who Jesus was to be: our Savior. We pray that we will acknowledge Jesus as Savior in all that we do and say. Are you really interested in searching diligently for the most important person in your life? What emotional distances are you willing to travel to find the one who is your King? What treasures are you willing to offer to Jesus? Are you corrupted by secular considerations, or are you willing to live counter-culturally when necessary? These are all very pertinent questions for all of us as we continue our journey of discipleship.

Sherry Weddell in *Forming Intentional Disciples* has noted that seekers (i.e. those searching for God) work through various thresholds in trying to determine whether to follow Jesus. They finally reach a point where a final decision whether or not to do so is required since seeking cannot continue forever. A deliberate act of the will is required.

To reach the decision to make that deliberate act, some questions first need to be answered. "What gives meaning to your life?" "What has your relationship with God been like to this point in your life?" "If you could ask God one question that you knew He would answer right away, what would it be?"

Weddell found many seekers lack a clear understanding of Jesus. She acknowledges that "We can no longer presume that people around us already know the story. On the contrary, we have to presume that (a) many don't know the basic facts of the Story; (b) a good deal of what they 'know' may be wrong; (c) they don't know how the parts of the story fit together to make a whole; and (d) they don't know what the story means for them personally. Nor do they know what it means for their family, friends, neighbors, co-workers, or the world."

Personally, we need to determine if we are spiritually ahead or behind in our knowledge of the Story (i.e. the life and message of Jesus). We need to evaluate how our individual life circumstances, opportunities to learn the message, and the openness to the Holy Spirit's guidance we've had in our lives.

Weddell remarks that it's only after we have "...an open heart ...that enables an individual to declare with faith 'Jesus is Lord."

God's story reveals we were "...created for a life full of love, peace, truth, beauty, goodness and meaning that begins now, lasts forever and can't be taken away...called the Kingdom or reign of God." We learn that Jesus'

earthly ministry is of healing and forgiving. Jesus' Passion narrative leads us to ponder how much God must love us.

A key to our faith is the historical event of the Resurrection having been attested to by many witnesses over many days. The witnesses not only gave testimony, but the quality of their lives changed.

According to Weddell, discipleship leads to recognizing one's personal sin and the need for forgiveness. She quotes another writer discussing young adults, "For a person to feel guilty, that person must have a sense of morality. But morality requires a potent sense of what is right and wrong, and it needs a powerful sense of what is true and false. Contemporary culture does not provide the average iGen with a profound grasp of what is right and wrong apart from the conviction that assaulting the self is clearly wrong."

We'll continue with Weddell's observations in the next article. May God grant you a wonderful week.

Usually sudden manifestation or perception of the essential nature or meaning of something or an intuitive grasp of reality through something usually simply and striking.


